

QUEEN ELIZABETH'S FREE GRAMMAR SCHOOL, SOUTHWARK.

The commemoration of the foundation of Queen Elizabeth's Free Grammar School for the parishes of St. Olave and St. John, Southwark, took place yesterday at the institution, Bermondsey-street. The attendance of the friends of

the pupils was very numerous, and the proceedings were altogether highly gratifying.

John Ledger, Esq., the warden, having taken the chair,
The Rev. Charles Mackenzie, A.M. (the master of the school), briefly addressed the assembly. He remarked that it was not usual to preface the speeches by any introductory remarks, but he would just state that three boys had recently been sent from the school to the universities -two of them to Cambridge and the other to Oxford, where they are now comfortably settled. The exhibitions, he added, are 80%. each.

We subjoin the list of subjects, with the names of the respective speakers, the whole of whom acquitted themselves most creditably, and were warmly applanded by their less fortunate competitors. We may add that Master Hardingham particularly distinguished himself in both the parts
